Olive Branch is located about 25/30 minutes from Memphis International Airport and/or from downtown Memphis.

2011 Annual Meeting Invitation: Steve Gallagher (Alaska) gave an official invitation to host the 2011 annual meeting in Anchorage, Alaska, on July 17-20, 2011. The delegates voted unanimously to accept Alaska's invitation to Anchorage and for this date.
